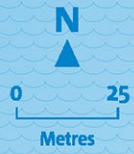


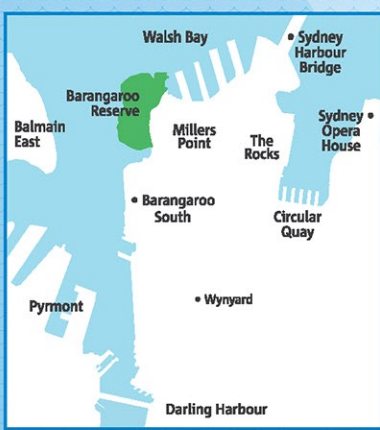
Barangaroo Reserve Map

Wulugul Walk
Wulugul Walk – following the 1836 foreshore – gets its name from *wulugul*, the Sydney Aboriginal word for kingfish, a prize catch for fishermen long before European settlement. The wulugul/kingfish has a golden band along its blue-green skin, aptly similar to the golden sandstone lining the blue of the Harbour along the length of the walk.

The Cutaway
The supersized, unique cultural venue hosting everything from art exhibitions, music concerts and food events to rehearsal rooms and commercial activities. It also incorporates the Merriman Street sandstone wall that is a graphic reminder of the area's maritime heritage.
